

LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Friends and Allies:

The story of Conroe Economic Development Council (CEDC) is one of economic growth and job prosperity, however none of this would be possible without the foundations of such a supportive community. Conroe continues to prosper as a place to work and live – balancing history, culture, beauty and business opportunity.

In 2023, the CEDC welcomed 6 new projects to Conroe and assisted in multiple expansion plans for preexisting Conroe companies. Oleon, a Belgiumbased company specializing in natural chemistry, exemplifies new companies attracted. With a grand opening June 29, the Conroe Park North plant is Oleon's first industrial production facility in North America and is expected to employ 116 people in the first 2 years.

Galdisa USA personifies companies expanding in Conroe. At its fifth anniversary this year, Galdisa announced plans to grow the company's first U.S. manufacturing location. A \$15-20 million investment during the next five years will expand the operations building, add state-of-the-art equipment and expand employment at the Conroe site.

CEDC aids workforce development through collaboration with education partners. This includes hosting thousands of students for Youth to Career day and attracting some 300 job-seekers for visits and interviews with more than 60 companies looking to fill jobs at the annual Conroe Job Fair.

We also help market Conroe through our internationally awarded "More is Made Here" campaign showcasing local businesses and building pride in Conroe-manufactured materials, events and quality of life activities. In fact, Hospitality is Made Here with Hyatt Regency Conroe's hotel & convention space opening in Grand Central Park on May 25.

As Conroe grows, the CEDC will change and grow with it. Conroe City Council appointed three new members to the Conroe Industrial Development Corporation (CIDC) board in December. As we welcome new members, we give thanks to previous leaders, who gave their time and talents to establish a foundation of growth that has generated positive results for Conroe.

Conroe Economic Development stands on a solid foundation, because of foundational leaders. Let us pause to remember Don A. Buckalew, our inaugural Economic Development Champion award winner and a member of the CEDC Advisory Board until his passing on July 1st. His guidance and leadership continue to have a profound impact on Conroe's economy. Mr. Buckalew's legacy as a visionary for Conroe's growth is fondly remembered by CEDC staff and his fellow board members, and will continue to benefit residents of Conroe for generations to come.

For Conroe and the CEDC, 2023 was a wonderful year full of new beginnings, grand openings, plans for expansion, and so much more. We hope you enjoy this year's CEDC Annual Report and look forward to all that we get to include in 2024!


CONROE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL

MISSION

To enhance the strength and stability of the greater Conroe economy through the support of existing industry and the attraction of manufacturing and service sector business (basic industries) which bring new capital and employment opportunities into the community.

CONCENTRATION

As a city department, we focus on the recruitment, retention, and expansion of large and small businesses. We are funded by 4B sales tax and overseen by the Conroe Industrial **Development Corporation** Board of Directors. Additionally, our CEDC Advisory Board includes key economic development allies who provide assistance with our strategic direction.



ANNOUNCED PROJECTS

AKSA POWER GENERATION

A Turkish company that manufactures industrial backup generators has consolidated its manufacturing facility from Monroe, LA and its sales office in Miami, FL to Conroe. They leased the former Dal-Tile/Energy Alloys building on Silver Springs Rd. The project has created 75 jobs with a \$20M capital investment.



CARMAX AUTO SUPERSTORES, INC.

The Virginia-based Fortune 200 company purchased 40 acres in Conroe Park North for a make ready/distribution/auction site of vehicles to serve the Houston market. They are anticipated to start construction on the project in 2025.



CORE & MAIN

Missouri-based Core & Main, a leading specialized distributor of water, wastewater, storm drainage and fire protection products purchased 15 acres in Conroe Park North to construct a new distribution facility. The project is expected to begin construction in 2024.



CM ROD FAMILY LP

The CM Rod Family LP purchased 8.44 acres in Conroe Park North for a build to suit warehouse facility for a to be determined client. As such, there is no information on capital investment or job creation yet.

HERTHA METALS

Hertha is a Conroe-based, woman-owned start-up that is developing an iron and steel manufacturing process that replaces coal with renewable power and hydrogen to reduce sector emissions by more than 90%. The company, backed by some of the most prominent venture capitalists in the world, has been conducting groundbreaking research from its Conroe headquarters and is already producing green iron and steel. They leased an 18,017 sf space in North Star Industrial Park within Conroe Park North.



HYUNDAI WELDING PRODUCTS, INC.

This U.S. subsidiary of the Korean company, known worldwide for its leadership in welding technology, bought 7.7 acres of land in Conroe Park North. They intend to build a \$23.4 million manufacturing facility dedicated to producing flux-cored welding wires for the North American and Canadian markets. Construction is scheduled to commence in 2026, with an anticipated creation of 24 job opportunities.



WORKHUB DEVELOPMENTS LLC

The innovative office/warehouse company offering 1,600 square feet and up of flexible industrial spaces and additional add-on amenities has purchased 6.33 acres within Conroe Park North for a new mini-business park.



PROJECT UPDATES

OLEON



Oleon, a Belgium-based company specializing in oleochemicals, celebrated the grand opening of their Conroe facility on June 29, 2023. The Conroe Park North plant is Oleon's first industrial production facility in North America. The company indicates the initial investment of \$55 million is just the beginning of their Conroe story. While early focus will be on blending operations, Oleon has ambitious plans for facility expansion.

BAUER EQUIPMENT AMERICA

The company broke ground on their initial Conroe Park North investment in October 2017, and the \$10.5 million, 78,000-square-foot facility became the company's North American headquarters when it opened in 2018. BAUER retained approximately 60 employees and expressed an expectation to add more jobs in the next five to

seven years. Fast forward to August 2023, BAUER celebrated the grand opening of an expansion project that more than doubled its space right next door to the original facility constructed less than five years ago. The expansion was a nearly \$13 million investment.



GALDISA USA



On July 6, Galdisa USA celebrated its fifth anniversary in Conroe Park North with gratitude, thanks and a commitment to grow the company's first U.S. manufacturing location in Conroe. Galdisa Corporate CEO Victor Galindo announced that the corporation plans to continue investing in Conroe. In addition to recent operations and warehouse expansion, Galdisa will invest between \$15-20 million in the next five years. This new investment includes expanding the building, adding state-of-the-art equipment and increasing employment at the Conroe site.

11TH ANNUAL CONROE JOB FAIR

More than 300 job seekers participated in the 11th annual Conroe Job Fair presented by the Conroe Economic Development Council (CEDC) and the Conroe/Lake Conroe Chamber on January 24. Despite inopportune weather conditions, some 64 companies and organizations with booths saw increased numbers of people looking for jobs and were excited about the number and quality of candidates attending.

Galdisa USA had more than 30 attendees visit about working at the peanut manufacturing plant in Conroe Park North that provides high quality peanut ingredients and retail products. The company is expanding its production operations and warehouse to provide more products into the U.S. market, as well as provide quality products for international sales. Galdisa established its U.S headquarters in Conroe in 2018 to reach the U.S. market and take advantage of the abundant and quality Texas peanut supply.

According to Galdisa USA's Business Development Director Amy Laux, "Quality is Galdisa's passion, and we are finding quality job candidates at the job fair in Conroe."

Epcon Industrial Systems, LP shared a similar experience. Epcon, which develops and manufactures innovative air pollution control technology and industrial heating equipment, was looking to fill career positions in four job categories and found multiple candidates for all the positions.

According to Epcon Application Engineer John Carlile, the company will return for future Conroe Job Fairs based on the number and quality of candidates.

Also at the booth, Epcon Field Service Representative Darrell Huddleston was equally as pleased and claimed that many times they had two lines that were several people deep waiting to visit about Epcon jobs.

Huddleston estimated they talked with as many as 80 people.

"We have a purchasing agent job position to fill, and we have at least five quality candidates we will schedule for interviews for that position," said Huddleston.

It was not only companies who had a great experience. Juan Jose Astudillo attended looking for a job. An experienced professional in business development, marketing and sales, Astudillo broadened his scope to seek work in various fields and meticulously visited booths, asked questions, provided a professional resume and concluded conversations with a firm handshake and smile.

Asked about whether the inclement weather was discouraging, Astudillo, originally from Ecuador, was optimistic.

In a unique twist, two women staffing VGXI's job fair booth advocating for others to join their new company were recent job candidates themselves. Sonia Padilla attended the Conroe Job Fair last year.

"I had been laid off from my job and was not feeling so great about myself. I was reluctant to attend the job fair," Padilla recalled. "When I got here, people were so welcoming. I highlighted the brochure with booths I would visit looking for an administrative job. I had highlighted the VGXI booth," she said while showing the year-old brochure.

"I would tell everyone 'just come' – you might find your career job. I plan to retire from VGXI."

Padilla said her job placement came through Spherion Staffing, which she visited at the 2022 fair. Spherion helped her land the job at VGXI.

Mackie Tucker, Padilla's coworker in the booth, also expressed the desire to eventually retire from the company, and it was just her second day on the job! Tucker has a connection to the job fair since she sought her job through Express Employment Professionals, which had a booth at the 2023 Conroe Job Fair to recruit more quality workers to place with growing Conroe companies. Both Tucker and Padilla believe they are experiencing their quality job because of the friendly environment created by one of Conroe's newest life science companies – and it all connects back to the annual Conroe Job Fair.



SEVENTH GRADE STUDENTS ENTHUSIASTICALLY EMBRACE CONROE'S YOUTH TO CAREER FAIR

The inaugural Youth to Career Fair attracted 1,800 seventh grade students from Conroe and Willis ISD schools to learn about careers in a diverse range of business and industry found in greater Conroe.

New Conroe manufacturer, Hertha Metals, provided students a look at how it is pioneering a new steel manufacturing process with reduced carbon emissions.

Female students were attracted to the woman-owned company booth hosted by CEO and founder Dr. Laureen Meroueh and operations & talent acquisition specialist Keyanna Jones. Prompted by student questions, Jones encouraged students to tackle challenges and study hard. She

Prompted by student questions, Jones encouraged students to tackle challenges and study hard. She shared with them that Hertha, which produces a different kind of steel, faces challenges and overcomes challenges to be the best company possible.

"It is beneficial for middle school students to discover new opportunities in Conroe, such as the revolutionary steel process at Hertha Metals, and to learn traditional careers available from our robust manufacturing industry," said Jennifer Matthews, Associate Director of Conroe Economic Development Council.

Welding has long been a popular traditional career for some young people. New technological advancements and high-tech options, such as welding simulators and robots, allow more young students to experience the feel and art of welding.

Technology has helped attract more male and female welding students into career and technology programs. The technological renaissance of Career and Technical Education delights both industry professionals and educators.

Brian Adams of AirGas shared his story of how "shop classes" kept him in school and has helped him earn a nice living in the crafts industry. He told students that 12-15 months training prepares students to earn \$25 per hour welding. The AirGas booth offered a hands-on welding simulator to provide students virtual opportunities to try their hand at welding.

In the neighboring booth, Mason Dupuis of Conroe Welding Supply provided similar advice while showing off a welding robot. When students asked what qualifications were needed for welding,

Dupuis responded "a high school diploma with some technical training helps students enter the welding field." Dupuis, an academically successful high school student selected for leadership classes, finds his career satisfaction in the crafts field.



YOUTH TO CAREER FAIR CONTINUED

The often-overlooked soft skills of career preparation were addressed at the Education for Tomorrow Alliance booth presenting proper phone and business etiquette, as well as how to dress for business success. An alliance of business and community volunteers, EfTA helps empower tomorrow's adults in the workplace.

Travis Utecht, director of Willis ISD Career and Technology Education, helped lead the event planning committee. He was pleased with student participation, noting that Willis had 550 seventh graders attending.

Students had specific questions to ask each booth which helped students engage in dialogue and learn about various Conroe careers.

"Due to assistance from Travis and others from Willis and Conroe ISDs, the Youth to Career Fair was a huge hit! Planning for next year's Career Fair starts soon," said Matthews.
